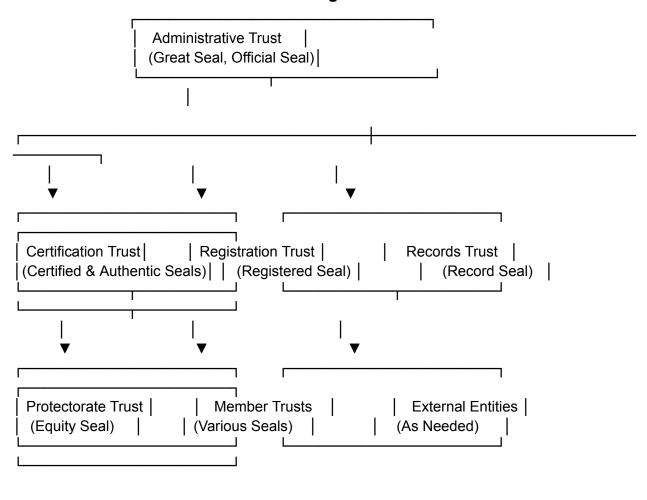

- Each registered item should include:
  - Document name
  - Date received
  - Trust seal applied
  - o Entry number
  - Signature of issuing trustee

# Phase 5: Governance & Expansion

# 8. Create Membership or Entity Entry Protocol

- Allow new trusts or members to register under your system.
- Issue Private Certificate of Entry sealed with the Registered Seal and Certified Seal.

# 9. Periodic Audits & Integrity Checks

Cross-check logs between Registration Trust and Records Trust.

- Have the Protectorate Trust review disputes and seal usage.
- Periodically issue system-wide updates or charters (sealed with the Great Seal).

#### 10. Train Trustees & Record Keepers

Provide simple training guides that include:

- Seal usage scenarios
- How to write trust minutes and apply the Record Seal
- How to issue and file authenticated or certified copies
- How to resolve disputes or violations internally

# **Optional: Digital Tools to Use**

- Notion, Airtable, or Obsidian: Digital ledger and seal logs
- PDF Editor with Digital Signature Tool: Apply seals
- **QR Code Generator**: Create verifiable codes tied to registry entries
- Cold storage (USB) or encrypted cloud: Protect sensitive documents
